Food Insecurity Hits Children Hardest

Numbers don't lie, especially when they're about children who are hungry.

Food insecurity — the lack of access to enough food to fully meet basic needs — is never good. What's worse is the finding from a United States Department of Agriculture 2010 study: food insecurity in households with children here in Southwest Florida is higher than the national average.

Nationally, 21.3 percent of all households are food insecure, compared to **Charlotte County: 29.6 percent; Collier: 24.1 percent; Glades: 27.6 percent; Hendry: 30.3 percent; and Lee: 28.2 percent.**

The Harry Chapin Food Bank, through 170 area agencies, distributed 3.9 million more pounds of food to children in 2010 than 2009. More than 90,939 children (63 percent of all children here) take part in free and reduced lunch programs. And during the worst time of the year for food insecurity — summer — just 9 percent of children get food assistance.

But even with school breakfast, lunch and after-class meal programs, the need is overwhelming, according to a national survey of public school teachers by Share Our Strength (strength.org/teachers). About

Volunteer Groups Get as Much as They Give

Many hands make light work for the Harry Chapin Food Bank.

Take Chico's. Before the holidays, the merchandise allocation team — including managers and directors — volunteered at the Food Bank in two half-day shifts. Each group first toured the Food Bank to learn how it worked. Then, one group packed fresh zucchini, squash, and peppers into bags for individual users, while the other sorted and packed canned goods.

"The tour was very touching, and some of us had tears in our eyes," said Ashley Levinson, Merchandise Allocator-Fashion Accessories for Chico's FAS. "We felt really good about what we were doing, and at the same time it was fun to chat

and hang out away from work. We hope to volunteer more regularly."

Hodges University's Allied Health Club does just that. This group of about 35 aspiring medical professionals sends between five and 15 volunteers to the Food Bank the last Wednesday of every month. From 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. they bag rice, sort cans, and do whatever chores are needed at the Food Bank warehouse.

Food Bank Math: How to Turn \$1 into \$6

From a report by WINK News, which went behind the scenes to learn how Harry Chapin Food Bank turns every donated dollar into \$6 worth of food:

One Tuesday morning, 13 Harry Chapin Food Bank trucks hit the road. On one route alone in Southwest Florida, a truck made 11 stops to collect donations from stores in the Retail Pick Up program. One of its stops was Wal-Mart, where it picked up between 400 and 500 pounds of food. The rescued food — vegetables, fruits, frozen meats and dairy products — would have gone to waste. Instead, the Food Bank is able to provide it to agencies serving our neighbors in need at a fraction of the food's value. **That's how the food bank multiplies every dollar!**

two-thirds (65 percent) of teachers regularly see children come to school hungry, and 41 percent buy food with their own money to compensate (an average of \$25 a month). Many of these children, particularly in urban and rural areas, rely on school meals as their primary source of nutrition.

One thing is clear from the "Hunger in Our Schools" report: Teachers see a strong connection between eating a healthy breakfast and a student's ability to concentrate, behave, and perform academically.

It's an issue the Naples Children & Education Foun-

dation takes seriously. As the founding organization of the Naples Winter Wine Festival, NCEF through its Lunch Boxes of Love initiative raised \$656,520 to address childhood hunger in Collier County.

The Harry Chapin Food Bank will be a primary partner in NCEF's efforts for the next three years. It is sending an NCEF-branded mobile pantry to Collier County four times a month, to distribute an additional 500,000 pounds of food — 33 percent more than in 2010.

More Charlotte County Families Face Hunger

Just like its neighbors, Charlotte County is seeing a huge increase in the need for food, and it's coming from families.

Thankfully, the amount of food distributed in the county by the Harry Chapin Food Bank has soared 163 percent between calendar years 2007 and 2010 — from 576,292 pounds to 1,515,615 pounds.

“For so many, unemployment payments have run out,” said Cecy Glenn, CEO, United Way of Charlotte County. “They may barely keep a roof over their heads, but they can't also feed their children.”

In fiscal year 2009-2010, this local United Way raised \$1.6 million, and it's pushing hard to match those numbers as its 2010-2011 fiscal year comes to a close.

“We are pleased to support the Food Bank in any capacity because of its fabulous outcomes,” said Glenn. “And Publix food drives have had a huge impact in our community.” So, too, has produce distribution — from just 21 pounds in 2007 to 286,063 pounds in 2010.

“People come in and say, ‘You don't know what this means to me,’” said Clara

Peters, President of St. Vincent de Paul Maximilian in Charlotte County. And because almost 70 percent of this agency's

enjoy the experience,” said Kera Browne, club president. “And we like the fact that all the food stays in the community.”

Marr. Employees made three-hour visits in June, August, and October, and twice each in November and December, developing a friendly competition among groups for who packaged more.

“We loved it, and it didn't seem like work,” said Marr. “Tickets for Time is such a wonderful program that we hope to get the Food Bank two tickets this year!”

In 2010, 858 volunteers from 195 businesses provided 4,094 hours of assistance; 178 volunteers from eight colleges gave 1,270 hours; and 225 volunteers from 24 high schools devoted 1,063 hours.
